JOB SUMMARY

The George A. Smathers Libraries at the University of Florida seek a collaborative, curious and knowledgeable colleague to lead the Baldwin Library of Historical Children's Literature. The Curator of the Baldwin Library of Historical Children's Literature is a year-round (12 month) tenure track library faculty position, which will lead a preeminent collection known for its exceptional breadth and depth in Anglo-American holdings. The Baldwin Library supports emerging scholarship by actively diversifying its holdings and applying a critical lens to collections and activities. The Curator oversees major endowment funds supporting collection development and programming, including speaker series and research fellowships.

The Curator manages materials and access, from acquisition to cataloging and digitization, and engages the UF campus and beyond through instruction, exhibits, collection promotion, and collaboration on projects and work groups. The Curator deepens and expands support for the study of children's literature and interdisciplinary topics, and engages with faculty, students, and the Center for Children's Literature and Culture. The Curator oversees fellowship programs which support the research of scholars, librarians and educators in the Baldwin Library, and serves as a bridge between public and academic librarians through the Louise Seaman Bechtel Fellowship.

The Libraries encourage faculty and staff participation in reaching management decisions, and consequently the Curator of the Baldwin Library will serve on various committees and teams. The Curator will pursue professional development opportunities, including research, publication, and professional service activities to meet library-wide criteria for tenure and promotion. The Smathers Libraries is

committed to creating a thoughtful, equitable, and inclusive culture that provides space for innovation and creativity. We support that commitment by offering a fulfilling work experience that allows for collaboration, growth, and development as well as shared perspectives.

RESPONSIBILITIES

The Curator will establish an inclusive vision for the Baldwin Library of Historical Children's Literature, skillfully managing and developing collections, services and programs, with support from colleagues and resources in the department and across the Libraries.

- **Vision**: Provide strategic direction for the Baldwin Library of Historical Children's Literature, skillfully managing and developing collections, services and programs. Create and update collection policies, and provide curatorial leadership.
- **Knowledge/Selection**: Acquire materials to meet emerging needs and to maintain strengths of the collection, staying current in areas of expertise required for best practices in field and for collection priorities. Establish and maintain vendor relationships.
- Management: Manage all aspects of the Baldwin Library of Historical Children's Literature holdings, support and services. Evaluate needs for and plan processing of materials, space and location, preservation and conservation, coordinating activities in collaboration with technical services staff and others.
- Administration: Manage personnel, projects, materials, and space allocations effectively, with sound stewardship of assets (funds, data, holdings). Report regularly on these activities, with efforts in seeking external funding through grants coordinated with Libraries grants staff. Maintain and cultivate relations with donors, in coordination with Libraries' administration and development staff.
- Access: Facilitate access to the Baldwin Library of Historical Children's Literature by providing research
 assistance, consultations, and orientations; availability for general public services as needed by
 Department; and general knowledge and promotion of Department collections and activities.
- **Instruction & Support**: Seek out and respond to requests for course-integrated instruction and specialized sessions for academic courses, with time commitments for co-teaching or teaching a course approved by Department Chair.
- Creation of Library Knowledge: With a priority for digital access, create structure and access to relevant research tools such as bibliographies or other descriptive guides in support of research and teaching. Design exhibitions, catalogs or interpretive writings to promote access in and outside UF.
- **Outreach**: Promote awareness of the collection through programs and events related to the collection and associated academic programs, tours.
- Professional Development and Scholarship: Acquire and maintain personal knowledge in children's
 literature and culture, with dissemination appropriate to work role and the mission of the University,
 and external recognition of expertise. Presentation, publication and creative outcomes are marked by
 originality, innovation, impact, peer evaluation and/or national or international distinction. Primary
 assignment activities that meet several of these criteria and comprise distinct research or creative
 endeavors are scholarship.
- Service Activities: Contribute to and participate in planning, policy development and departmental decision making related to services and collections in the Department of Special and Area Studies Collections, the George A. Smathers Libraries, and to the University. Contribute to and participate in appropriate professional and library organizations in a manner that has an impact on the profession and contributes to the diffusion of knowledge. Contribute to the public good through engagement with communities, consistent with work role and assignment at the University.

QUALIFICATIONS

Required:

• Master's degree in library science from an ALA accredited library school or advanced degree in a field relevant to children's literature or historical childhood studies.

- Minimum two (2) years of relevant experience for appointment as Assistant University Librarian.
 Minimum eight (8) years of relevant experience required for appointment as Associate University Librarian.
- Knowledge of and experience working with children's literature or historical childhood studies as an academic discipline.
- Experience curating or providing access to library, archival or other collections.
- Demonstrated experience with making libraries more accessible, and welcoming through teaching, research, or service.
- Excellent oral and written communication and presentation skills.
- Ability to work effectively in teams and individually with faculty, staff and students.
- Initiative, flexibility, and the ability to seek out opportunities in a complex, dynamic academic environment.
- Demonstrated organizational and planning skills.
- Strong potential for meeting the <u>requirements of tenure and promotion</u>.
- Evidence of excellent interpersonal skills including oral and written communication.
- Ability to work both independently and collaboratively with faculty, students, administrators, and the general public.
- Initiative, flexibility, and the ability to adapt and work creatively in a complex, rapidly changing academic environment.
- Strong potential to meet the requirements for tenure and promotion outlined in the <u>departmental by-laws</u>.

BALDWIN LIBRARY OF HISTORICAL CHILDREN'S LITERATURE

The <u>Baldwin Library of Historical Children's Literature</u> contains more than 130,000 books, ephemera such as board games and puzzles, and a small number of manuscript collections. The Baldwin Library has the largest collection of Early American juvenile books (pre-1823) of any academic institution. The Baldwin Library is also strong in comparative editions, particularly of the following works: *Robinson Crusoe*, *Pilgrim's Progress*, *Alice's Adventures in Wonderland*, and *Aesop's Fables*. The Baldwin Library began when Ruth M. Baldwin donated her collection of 35,000 items to the University of Florida in 1977. These materials were primarily from the 17th century through 1900, from the United States and the United Kingdom, and books that were used by children. The historical strength of the Baldwin Library is Anglo-American children's literature, comprising the most comprehensive collection in the specialization among academic libraries. Since 1980, the collection has grown to include materials through the present day, and expanded to include young adult literature, series books, nonfiction, and specialty editions, with additional interdisciplinary areas such as interactive technologies, race, and science increasingly diversifying the collection.

The Baldwin Library is part of the <u>Special and Area Studies Collections Department</u>, which embraces international, circulating, and special collections in its holdings, services, programs, and personnel responsibilities. It is one of four preeminent collections that distinguish Smathers Libraries, along with the

Latin American and Caribbean Collection; the Isser and Rae Price Library of Judaica; and Florida History Collections. The department is committed to promoting intercultural understanding and acceptance among library users and library staff by educating, empowering, and creating self-awareness in the context of a global society. We are committed to using the Libraries' expertise, programs, collections, and services to foster an environment of inclusion and equality with fairness, appreciation for individual differences, and respect for all.

UNIVERSITY OF FLORIDA LIBRARIES

The libraries at the University of Florida form the largest academic information resource system in the state of Florida with seven libraries and two off-campus facilities. The George A. Smathers Libraries are comprised of six campus libraries and off-site facilities. In addition to this system, the Lawton Chiles Legal Information Center is part of the Levin College of Law. The Libraries hold over 6.27 million print volumes, 1.5 million e-books, over 197,000 full-text journals, over 1000 electronic databases, 1.3 million documents, and 1.4 million maps and images. Yonge Library of Florida History. The Libraries maintain partnerships and participate in a variety of collaborative, international projects while engaging with the UF community. We are a member of the Association of Research Libraries (ARL) and other regional library consortia.

The <u>library staff</u> comprises more than 300 FTE librarians, technical/clerical staff and student assistants. The George A. Smathers Libraries are strong advocates for inclusion and intellectual freedom. The Libraries' commitment to both is articulated in the <u>Inclusion and Intellectual Freedom Statements</u>. Support for professional development is central to the Smathers Libraries. Supports include a formal mentoring program, a robust training program, release time for research and professional service, a comprehensive grants program, and funding for professional development travel.
